Music and Faith in Myanmar


It is a temperate December day here in Cambridge; I am sitting at my desk preparing for one more journey to Myanmar: special trip insurance, endless vaccinations, packing lists, educational materials, music scores and more. It is hard to believe that this trip marks my third in the last four years. While you wait out a long and cold January, I will be in the extreme heat and humidity of Yangon, followed by the frigid temperatures of the western mountain region.

While there was much damage and destruction throughout the country, fortunately, orphanages and villages in the western Chin State were not adversely affected by the heavy rainfalls, severe flooding and landslides that occurred in July and August. I do, however, await the full impact of the election held in November. Although Aung San Suu Kyi's party now has a majority in the 664 seat Parliament, the military still commands the crucial ministries of Defense, Border Affairs, and Home Affairs.

I depart for Myanmar on January 1, 2016, and will be back in worship with you on Sunday, January 24. The time away is a true gift, and I am ever grateful to this congregation for affording me the opportunity to deliver the transforming power of our faith to people whose lives look nothing like our own. First Congregational Church has been an integral part of each of my trips—pilgrimages, if you will—because of steady and faithful generosity—generosity of spirit, money and time. This year, the Outreach and Mission Ministry have kindly and

generously awarded a grant that will substantially impact the lives of children and youth in a poverty-stricken population. We have achieved a major success with Metta Geha, our orphanage high in the mountains of Kanpetlet: we have instituted a daily meal plan that adds protein and vegetables to the basic rice diet. With rising food costs, FCCW's grant will go a long way to ensuring balanced nutrition and care for these beautiful children.


This year, my time will be divided between three institutions. My first week is dedicated to the eager and talented students of Gitameit Music Conservatory in Yangon (Rangoon). There I will conduct four choral ensembles, from a large mixed chorus to a small professional close harmony group, as well as coach classical chamber music and teach instrumental and choral conducting. The next ten days will be devoted to two wonderful orphanages/ schools in Myanmar. Sanda Rama Monastic Education Post Primary School, located in the outer slums of Yangon, is a successful example of the "Monastery School" system. It is run by the Buddhist Monastery next door to the school, and the head monk has been a true visionary. We are partnering with the monastery to stock and supply a critically needed medical clinic. This clinic has even succeeded in staffing a doctor 1-2X per week; the care afforded to the children of the school is also afforded to the entire surrounding community. This monastery has provided a model for successful community support—of a type that is



As always, I leave with a mixture of trepidation and determination. It is hard to leave home, to leave my family and my comfortable life. But it is you, all of you at First Congregational Church, who bolster me as I go on another journey. I welcome your prayers and your thoughts, and I look forward to being with you once again, as I mount the "hidden tide and travel/Back home."

Your Leadership Team at Work

The Leadership Team is starting to hit our stride, and we have made good progress in recent months. In November, we solidified some of our internal operating rules, with much prayer and reflection. Judy led us through the exercise of developing a covenant of how we will operate, including our expectations of one another and our approach to discernment. We also discussed the best way to record and share minutes of our meetings with the congregation for utmost transparency. Finally, we continued the process of determining where decision making authority should lie for various re-

stricted funds.

At our December meeting, we discussed the upcoming budget process, wherein a subset of the Leadership Team will work closely with Treasurer Elizabeth Cooper and representatives of various ministries to develop a budget for fiscal year 2016 to be brought to the congregation for a vote in February.

The Leadership Team is also working on developing a strategic plan for the coming year that will holistically consider all of the good work going on throughout the congregation to ensure we are living into all aspects of



our mission statement. The LT will be working with the Purpose Forum to reach out to the various ministries for input to inform the plan as they put together their annual reports. It's an exciting time in the life of the church and a great chance to reflect on the vibrant year we've had and look forward to the future with faith and vigor.



Opening the Invitations of Epiphany

What was your last epiphany? Was it frightening or energizing? Or perhaps a bit of each? The word "epiphany" means "manifestation, realization, or disclosure." Usually it comes as a sudden perception or striking event revealing the essential nature or meaning of something. Spiritually it is about gaining a new perspective, recognizing a new awareness dawning. It may mean viewing what has been with us all along, but now from a different perspective, with a new consciousness.

In our Christian calendar, January 6 is Epiphany. The joyous twelve days of Christmas come to a close and usher in this season of the continuation of new light and new truth being revealed in our lives day by day. Will we open these invitations?

Sometimes these revelations of the Spirit are welcome and wonderful events. At other times, the revelations are difficult, inviting or demanding us to change some of the ways we have been living. New growth, new understanding, new consciousness often signals the end of old patterns of being, challenging us to let go of "comfort zones" which we cling to

even after they have finished their purpose in our lives and we are called to new ways of living, loving our neighbors, ourselves, and our God.

UCC minister Ruth Duck has written these words to a favorite Epiphany hymn:

"Arise, your light is come! The Spirit's call obey;

Show forth the glory of your God which shines on you today.

Arise, your light is come! Fling wide the prison door;

Proclaim the captive's liberty, Good tidings to the poor.

Arise, your light is come! All you in sorrow born;

Bind up the broken-hearted ones and comfort all who mourn.

Arise, your light is come! The mountains burst in song!

Rise up like eagles on the wing; God's power will make us strong!"

May this Epiphany be a time when we allow ourselves to be present to the deepening mystery of our faith and the revelations of how to be present to others who have found "no room in the inn" this Christmas. May we

accompany them through times of illness, depression, grief, poverty and other realities that come upon us as human beings in our varieties of life's circumstances. Our baptismal vows ask us to live out the reality that we are each "beloved creations of God", and "one body with many members", each an important part of the growth of the whole. No one is to be left out of the welcome at the table of God. God's family expands.

God hovers over our times of chaos and apparent emptiness, ready to birth new possibilities in our lives and our world. Light dawns. Together we discover ways of treating each other and ourselves with compassion and gentleness, as we are reminded that God's love is far more powerful than our greatest fears, that our spiritual truth reminds us that we are not alone in our search for meaning and hope. Together let us explore ways that God journeys with us no matter what our current conditions. May our thanks be always to God, bringing light into our shadowed lives.

I told him that I was reading the story that he was going to learn on Sunday. He asked me to read it to him. I finished and he wanted me to read the next one!" During Midwinter Worship, we will be learning the same stories as the adults. We will not have class on January 17th because of it being MLK weekend. Starting in February Stepping Stones will begin a once a month Chapel Service. Please keep your eyes and ears posted for more information about these. Each week we have between 30-35 children, and it keeps growing!

The 6th grade class combined with Rite 13 to learn about poverty and create beaded jewelery out of homemade beads. They raised over \$200 for the Bead for Life project. Though their class is small, they have a great lesson that most weeks goes with what Stepping Stones is learning, but sometimes it is related to a current event.

Rite 13 raised over \$500 during our Cookie Walk. A huge thanks to all of you who helped out! They are currently learning about making life decisions in their classes. The lessons involve different types of media to help engage the students. On an average week we have around 10-12 youth!

J2A is on their last leg of the program and preparing for the pilgrimage happening in June. They are looking into doing the Hancock Stair Climb which raises money for MS Society. They had an eye-opening experience during a grocery store scavenger hunt when they realized how expensive food is to eat!


