

## Greetings from the Treasurer

I want to touch on three items this month. First, we have hired a new bookkeeper to fill an expanded role (approximately 8 hours per week) in an effort to relieve Sarah, our office manager, of some financial tasks that she had been covering. Clarinda Massengill, our new bookkeeper, lives in Billerica and provides contract bookkeeping services for several small businesses, including a church in Boston. So she has knowledge of, and experience with, the peculiar financial issues connected with running a church. She can generally be found in the treasurer's office on Tuesdays, preparing checks for the treasurer's signature, reconciling monthly bank, payroll, and credit card statements, and entering all of our financial transactions into the church's database. If

you happen by the church on a Tuesday, introduce yourself and welcome Clarinda aboard.

Speaking of the church's financial database, we have moved our host software from a local desktop computer to the web, which provides both remote access for users of the database and automated, secure and regular back-ups to the cloud. Later this year the Leadership Team will be evaluating our overall information technology (IT) infrastructure and developing a plan to keep us current with evolving technology.

Finally, a quick word about pledges. To date our members have collectively done a great job keeping up (and even slightly ahead) of planned pledge giving, thereby alleviating some of my earlier concerns about cash flow.



However, the summer months are just around the corner, so I'm making a special appeal to everybody to think about getting your pledge contributions for the summer into the collection plate before you head off on vacation. # Being Mortal Discussion Well-Attended and Meaningful

In April, the Adult Faith Exploration Ministry sponsored an 11th Hour discussion of the book and DVD Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End by Atul Gawande. "A deeply affecting, urgently important book—one not just about dying and the limits of medicine but about living to the last with autonomy, dignity, and joy." (Katherine Boo, Pulitzer Prize winning journalist.) Gawande is a surgeon at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, a staff writer for The New Yorker, author of several books and a professor at Harvard Medical School and the Harvard School of Public Health.

This program was part of a larger effort at church to bring about a greater comfort level in talking about death and dying. Through Health Ministry 11th Hours conversations about hospice and palliative care, conversations about placement of ashes in the Reno Garden, and this book discussion, we are beginning to explore meaning, faith and values in our lives.

For those who couldn't join the April session, here's what we learned:

- Discussing death and how we prepare for it doesn't come naturally to most of us.
- Both patients and doctors have difficulty talking about death and dying. Much of the book is about the medical profession and the need to better equip doctors to be able to discuss diminishing abilities and the dying process with their patients.
- Elisabeth Kübler-Ross' cycle of grief—denial, anger, bargaining, depression and acceptance—wasn't emphasized in the book and DVD, especially the need to come to acceptance of death and then live the fullest, best quality of life one can have even in the midst of that acceptance.
- Without honest conversations among patients, family members and doctors, opportunities for 'living to the last with autonomy, dignity and joy' can be missed.
   Naming and discussing hopes, fears and dreams are

vitally important. Dignity is a very personal thing and varies widely by individual.

- Quality of life can include music, skyping with relatives, scripture, reconciling relationships, ice cream!
- There is a program, "The Conversations Project" (http://theconversationproject.org), that focuses on bringing conversations about wishes for end-of-life care to gatherings at the dinner table—not the intensive care unit—with the people we love, before it's too late.

Atul Gawande's suggested questions for patients, families and doctors to discuss:

- What are your fears and worries about dying?
- What are your priorities if time is short?
- What are you willing to sacrifice and what are you not willing to sacrifice?
- What are your wishes for after your death?

We were grateful for the level of trust and honesty in the room at this session, for the willingness of participants to share experiences, hopes and fears. Those who felt comfortable sharing did. Those who didn't want to share personal experiences didn't have to. It was a time of listening, learning, sharing, and communing. It was one step on the path of making conversations about death less socially, and personally, uncomfortable.

## Wondering About Wonder

"Concepts create idols. Only wonder comprehends anything." These words attributed to Gregory of Nyssa, who lived in the 4th Century, may help us navigate our own spiritual paths in these uncertain, complex, ambiguous, and sometimes volatile times. June offers me opportunities for wonder if I take the time to be in the glorious "growing season" of New England, when all of nature seems to ask me to stop my fretting and practice "considering the wondrous works of God."

Sitting on a bench in our beautiful Reno Garden while pondering the beauty of Wedge Pond behind our church, wandering through the amazing Fells just up the street, listening to the little waterfall in the Aberjona in Winchester Center: all these are only physically steps away from me. Yet often I let my too-full agenda and constant daily routines keep me distracted and far away from these small wonders that surely are invitations from God to "taste

What precedes heartfelt faith is reverence and awe. We can domesticate God. Our routines and rituals can limit even God to "more of the same": more of the same sense of our unexamined selves and communities, more of the same of almost anything can inure us for good or ill to things, actions, ways of being in our lives.

and see that the Lord is good."

But God invites us out of our unconsciousness into the new consciousness of wonder, love, and praise. There is a passage in Exo-

dus (33:7-11) that says: "And everyone who sought the Lord would go out to the tent of meeting, which was outside the camp." This meant that people needed to go outside of their ordinary, daily rituals at times in order to meet God. Can we let June and the invitations of summer lead us "outside our camp" of our old ideas and expectations and learn to love, not disregard or fear, what lies beyond our control? God's love is beyond anything we can get used to. God's love is not



in our control, our earning, even our deserving. It is amazing, wondrous, full of reverence and awe! It is God who makes of our own lives, with all of their chasms and precipices, Grand Canyons of grace and beauty. Are you willing to "hike the Grand Canyon" of your own fully lived experience this June,

> even here in Winchester or wherever you find yourself?

> I must admit to enjoy the ways my routines help me "float" through the day. But I also know that sometimes the "white-water rafting" that God is placing before me asks me to be more conscious, more loving, more courageous, more generous than I had planned. To be invited to practice "wonder and adoration" of life itself, all of its mountains and valleys, its vast oceans and small streams is a spiritual discipline that June always reminds me to practice. And the more I can practice it, the more I may be able to build the courage to enter these unknown places beyond my control

in which I can trust God to be in control and show me a whole new way of being. A way hinted at by my friend in hospice as he took his last breath and exclaimed, "There's wonder in this, too!" God help us live in wonder, love, and praise. Amen.


